The Center Hosts First Rural Healthcare Ethics ECHO



On Wednesday September 22, 2021 the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center (GRHIC) hosted its first Rural Healthcare Ethics ECHO (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) session with Dr. Brian Childs and Dr. Lauren Bunch, Mercer University School of Medicine. The group of fourteen participants consisted of a wide range of rural health professionals from all parts of the state. The sessions started with an overview of Informed Consent, allocation of scarce resources, defining death (universal definition of death), withdrawal of life-sustaining treatment and how technology interacts with ethics to start the discussion.

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Center Offers Community Health Needs Assessments



The Center has recently partnered with Harmony Medical Foundation to provide a Community Health Needs Assessment for Greene, Hancock, Morgan, and Putnam counties. Using primary and secondary data retrieval, namely, surveys and focus groups, the Center will provide information on their healthcare providers and healthcare infrastructure, as well as the health behaviors of the community members. This Community Health Needs Assessment will provide these communities with data and information to better understand their unique healthcare needs allowing them to effectively expand medical services for the area.

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The Maternal Health Pilot Project - Bringing Prenatal Services to Rural Georgia

The Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center is collaborating with community partners Dr. L. Joy Baker, MD, FACOG, PMH-C, C-EFM, MT (ASCP), WellStar Medical Group Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Dr. Keisha Callins, MD, MPH, OB/GYN, Community Health Care Systems (Jones/Twiggs) to develop and implement the Maternal Health Pilot Project.

The goal of this program is to bring monthly prenatal services to rural Georgia counties that currently do not have any prenatal care services. Working with office-based, high-end general imaging ultrasound equipment and hand-held ultrasound equipment, approved practice guidelines for the performance of obstetrical ultrasound will be used.

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Center Collaborates with MUSM on Autism Detection

Research Assistants, <u>Joy Joseph, MPH</u> and <u>Dahlia Al-Haleem, MSES</u> under supervision of <u>Dr. Anne Montgomery</u>, have teamed up with Dr. Sarah Rotschafer, Assistant Professor, Mercer University School of Medicine, for the analysis of demographics and symptoms of autism that lead to testing for autism in children. The data collection and organization was managed by Dr. Rotschafer, and led to approximately 700 patient intake forms filled out by parents of children with suspected autism spectrum disorders.


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Community Health Reporter Program

Dr. Kimberly Carr Presents to Georgia Senate Committee on Improving Health Food Access and Ending Food Deserts




Dr. Kimberly Carr, Community Resource Specialist, Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center reports on improving health through food access.

On September 15, 2021 at Valdosta State University, <u>Dr. Kimberly Carr</u>, Community Resource Specialist, Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center, presented, "Addressing the Food Plight in Rural Georgia: Innovative Ways for Community Involvement" to the Georgia Senate Study Committee and other invited stakeholders. The Georgia Senate formed the Senate Study Committee on Improving Healthy Food Access and Ending Food Deserts to address these public health and economic issues facing many rural Georgians.

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The Dr. Anne Montgomery Co-Authors Study on Rib Plating

On October 1, 2021, Dr. Dennis Ashley, MUSM, Trauma Surgeon at Atrium health, will be presenting to the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma (AAST) on a rib plating study paper titled "Prospective Randomized Trial of Metal vs Resorbable Plates in Surgical Stabilization of Rib Fractures." This paper which was co-written by, Dudley B. Christie, III, MD, Eric L. Long, MD, Rajani Adiga, MS, Tracy J. Johns, MSN, Josephine Fabico-Dulin, RN, and Anne Montgomery, PhD - Atrium Health Navicent, Mercer University School of Medicine and Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center,



looked at the differences between typical titanium rib plating done for broken ribs, and the newer resorbable plates (which integrate and dissolve into the bone).
