Pediatric Mental Health Initiative Expanding

Ben Hill County School System's Pediatric Mental Health Initiative has been selected as a Sow a Seed 2021 grant recipient based on their collaborative approach to addressing the mental health needs of their students through telehealth and to support the continuation of this program into the summer months, and beyond.

The Pediatric Mental Health Initiative's pilot program began providing services in October 2021 at Ben Hill County Elementary School. This initiative has now been expanded to all five schools in the county with approximately 20 students being served. This partnership is a collaboration that continues to grow; including the Ben Hill County Board of Education, College of Professional Advancement, Mercer University (CoPA), Marriage and Family Therapy (MFT) Program at Mercer University School of Medicine, and Global Partnership for Telehealth. The cornerstone of the initiative is the delivery of virtual counseling services to students. The initiative also provides mental health screening tools, suicide prevention training to educators, community members, and students and sponsors community special events and health fairs.

Autism Awareness Program Expands Resources



Many families in rural Georgia face barriers to receiving a diagnosis and attaining treatment for autism spectrum disorder. The Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center partners with Global Partnership for Telehealth and their Toddler Tracks program to bring awareness to this issue and present online options for support. The Toddler Tracks program, directed by Boyd Mark, spoke with us about the expansion of their program. This virtual autism resource boasts a full website with training and early detection modules available at no cost to the public. It helps caregivers understand the early warning signs of autism because early detection leads to better outcomes for the child. Their website also provides modules on behavior modification for those who suspect autism, but who have not yet been diagnosed or treated for their symptoms.

Toddler Tracks is also expanding its program to specifically target parents in need of this information directly in their pediatrician's office. They are reaching out to rural providers to place pamphlets and easy scan QR codes in the patient rooms to increase knowledge about the program and their caregiver training.

On April 23, 2022, Reach2Teach located in Putnam County hosted a Health Literacy Festival at the New Life Outreach Christian Center. Reach2Teach was a recipient of the Sow A Seed Grant provided by the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center in 2021. Reach2Teach has been diligently working to increase vaccination rates for the COVID-19 virus as well as bring awareness to other chronic illnesses affecting the Putnam County community and hosting blood drives to increase blood donations. During the health literacy festival participants were provided health education materials, a healthy lunch, and tickets to win door prizes. CORE (Community Organized Relief Effort) was also on hand to provide the opportunity for participants to sign up for upcoming COVID-19 vaccination events. Local physician Dr. Eddie Richardson spoke to participants regarding vaccine hesitancy, the importance of getting the COVID-19 vaccination and living a healthy lifestyle.

Grocery Store Initiative in Talbot County to Address Food Disparities

On April 1, 2022, a community meeting was held at the Talbot County Chamber of Commerce and Development Authority to discuss a grocery store initiative to address food disparities inclusive of lack of access and availability to healthy and nutritious foods and the grocery store's impact on local economic development. This initiative is spearheaded by community and food advocate leader, *Jane Lockhart*, pictured right, owner of Frank and Olive's Marketplace, Inc. In attendance at the community meeting were federal and local governmental leaders, pastors, and community members.

Talbot County, population 6,321, currently has no grocery store with a food insecurity rate of 17.7%, higher than that of the food insecurity rate in Georgia (14.4%) and the United States (12.6%), per the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Data Hub sourced by the United

States Census Bureau and *Feeding America*. Residents have to drive to neighboring counties such as Muscogee (Columbus) and Meriwether (Manchester), approximately 20-40 minutes away, to have access to a grocery store. A grocery store has not been present in Talbot County for close to 20 years.

National Drug Take Back Day - Warren County





The Center Hosts Virtual Mental Health First Aid Classes



Mental Health is an area of wellness often camouflaged by stigma, fear, doubt, and even

embarrassment. The National Council for Mental Well-being even says that "people living with mental health and substance use challenges were imprisoned, tortured and subjected to inhumane treatment. Our society has come a long way since then, however, the stigmatization of these challenges is still a significant problem." It is for these very reasons that the Georgia Rural Health Innovation Center has made the commitment to educate community members and health care professionals with the Mental Health First Aid Course. This 6-hour virtual course provides participants with "a single 5-step action plan known as ALGEE, which includes assessing risk, respectfully listening to and supporting the individual in crisis, and identifying appropriate professional help and other support".

On March 30, 2022, *Dr. Kedrick Williams* and *Glenda Grant* presented this course to employees of Phoebe Sumter Medical Center, leaders of civic organizations, and community members. The 12 participants learned how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness and substance use disorders. Upon evaluating the course, a participant shared that "The Course was very beneficial for me as a participant and for those that I will be able to assist with the knowledge gained. The material was very well presented and the atmosphere was great." Another participant expressed their thoughts by saying, "AWESOME!! AWESOME!! COURSE. THE INSTRUCTORS WERE AWESOME AS WELL!!"

Recruitment is already underway to fill the next virtual Mental Health First Aid training course which will be held on June 14, 2022.


